## About this guidance

This guide provides an assessment tool to ensure that nature and biodiversity considerations are included in the Local Plans at any stage of the policy planning or review. A series of principles to evaluate this have been developed using the NPPF and NPPG that support the priorities and outcomes devised by The Tees Valley Nature Partnership (TVNP).

#### **Completing the assessment**

The plan can be scored against each TVNP desired outcome as green, amber or red. Brief evidence must be shown for what choice is made. At the end, generate a score and assess what action, if any is needed. Please then submit the assessment to TVNP Planning and Nature Working Group who will review, comment and ultimately 'sign off' the final assessments.
