Wonderful wildflowers

Birdsfoot Tefoil

member of the pea family, this is the food plant for the common blue butterfly. Its yellow flowers look like little slippers and appear in small clusters. They are followed by seed pods that look distinctly like bird's feet or claws. Other common names include 'Butter and Eggs', 'Eggs and Bacon', and 'Hen and Chickens' which refer to the egg-yolk yellow flowers and reddish buds.

Field scabious

The dainty, lilac blooms that bob on the end of long stalks. It is a lovely sight on wayside banks at the tail-end of summer. The pom-pom like nature of its flower has given rise to alternative names such as 'Lady's pincushion' and 'blue bonnets'. A member of the teasel family its flowers are highly attractive to butterflies and bees.

Meadow vetchling A scrambling plant with long stems that end with a group of yellow A scrambling plant with long stems that end with a group of yellow, pea-like flowers. The flowers are followed by shiny, black seed pods that look like peapods. Its leaves comprise a single pair of leaflets that have tendrils. Groups of four to twelve yellow flowers appear between May and August attracting bees and wasps.

Red clover

t's reddish-pink flowers form oval clusters and its leaves - while still recognisably 'cloverleaf' shaped - are larger, downy and marked with a white 'V'. It is not as common as its white relation, red clover and is an important nectar source for bees and although wide-pread is becoming less common. In "the olden days" children used suck nectar from the flowers when sweets were in short supply.
