Government context

David Rutley

The government is committed to keeping public forests and woodlands in trust for the nation.



- Defra's <u>25 Year Environment Plan</u> provides the overall context for Defra's future focus.
- The government consulted widely in spring 2018 on the future for agricultural and forestry policy after EU exit. The results are being fed into the development of environmental land management schemes. Forest Services are working closely on how these will help the government to achieve its ambitions with relation to forestry.
- The importance of woods and forests for climate change resilience and for wellbeing is being increasingly recognised by government.
- Forestry England will continue to set out its aspirations for how we will help deliver the 25 Year Environment Plan.



The future Forestry Commission -

From 1 April 2019 the Forestry Commission will become an England only body. It will be comprised of Forest Services, Forest Research and a reorganised Forest Enterprise (PFE) which will be rebranded as Forestry England.

Board appointments and structure:

From the 1st April 2019 there will be new boards for Forestry England, Forest Services and Forest Research, as well as a new Executive Board.

Brand identity implementation: FE is well advanced with its brand transformation including an updated version of the 'two trees' logo. FC/FS will retain the original logo, and FR will continue with their current branding.

The future Forestry Commission: future roles







Forest Services: FS will continue within the Forestry Commission as the government's expert forestry body in England, but will have its own governance. Increasingly there will be closer links to Defra, with FS making a significant contribution to the Defra strategy. There will continue to be a close relationship between FS and FE, with some shared corporate services remaining for the time being.

Forest Research: FR will become more distinct and will serve England, Scotland and Wales as forestry experts. It will operate as an agency of the FC.

Forestry Commission Scotland: The Forestry and Land Management (Scotland) Bill has passed all stages through the Scottish Parliament and received Royal Assent. The Act is planned to come into force from 1 April 2019. Two forestry agencies of the Scottish Government will be established: Forestry and Land Scotland (FLS) and Scottish Forestry (SF). Both agencies will launch on 1 April 2019.


