

LWS's

Update on proposed LWS sites:

1. St Joseph's Cemetery Grassland

RM this is progressing, have written a letter and will fast-track this.

Outstanding LWS recommendations:

2. South Bank Station Black Path Grassland

FH there is a part where the council doesn't know who owns it, has contacted Network Rail but no response yet. **MA** will prepare maps and species criteria so that the next meeting can consider whether the site might be selected as a whole or in part.

3. Aislaby Grange A67 road verge Grassland

MA new access road for airport is looking to go through this road verge. Would need the area to be left uncut so before a survey could determine whether sufficient species are present for LWS selection.

- 4. <u>Bishopsgarth Grassland</u> (Hardwick Dene Grassland) **DA** quite a big site, not just the portion **MA** has highlighted. Best way forward might be to draw a bigger line around the site, it does have a play area in the middle, although this need not be an issue. **DA** was satisfied that the area is not under threat (in SBC control) and that the ecological interest could be incorporated into plans for the area as these become available.
- 5. <u>Greystones A174</u> central reservation grassland. Site managers (Sir Robert McAlpine) are supportive of managing and protecting the site and had sought Bioidversity Road Scheme Funding. No recent news on this. **JG** will maintain watching brief and report back in due course.
- 6. Blackwell Grange Golf Course on hold
- 7. Stainton Way Grassland
 - a. Update from MA

Should be ready to go, has been to steering group.

- 8. Brass Castle Lane Grassland
 - a. On hold pending further visits from MA & SB

Other Sites

1. Naisberry Quarry

MA was a report that this no longer has what it is designed for, could be deselected. Do we deselect it and then go through selection process. TS reported that a development for the site had outline permission and would include mitigation relating to the LWS designation. It would therefore be best to leave the designation in place until this had been agreed. The value of the wider site could then be assessed and reconsidered.

	2. Bluebell Beck MA had looked at the Stainsby Masterplan and found a number of positives for biodiversity. He had also submitted queries and recommendations to the planners.
NA/08.04.20 AOB	 Middlesbrough green-blue infrastructure consultation draft published, looks positive. DA a development site at Whitehouse farm, Ingleby Barwick had identified a GCN pond / adjacent terrestrial habitat. Guidelines would indicate that this should be designated as LWS. It was agreed that the site would be secured on the basis of legal protecting for GCN. Also, that the group might want to reconsider this criteria on the basis of District Level Licencing which is enabling restoration of gcn populations to the wider countryside for which continuing LWS selection might be inappropriate. FH had attended the District level licencing seminar for NE Yorkshire and asked if TVWT had received info on this. JG wanted to submit a query on Carlin Howe Farm and would copy FH into his response. PS asked if local authorities might be able to share LWS layers? PS to email across info SB asked if more info on the work of TVNP could be shared at the NAWG. RM agreed that this would be an excellent standing agenda item.
